| (2022–2023) Phase 1A: Fence, landscaping, roads and utilities | Estimated Cost: \$1.5 million |
| (2023–2024) Phase 1B: First academic building, women’s dormitory, first stage of Jesuit residence | Estimated Cost: \$5.5 million* |
| (2024–2025) Phase 1C: Second academic building, men’s dormitory, second stage of Jesuit residence, dispensary, and athletic fields | Estimated Cost: \$8.5 million |

Total PHASE 1 cost: \$15.5 million

- (2025–2028) **PHASE 2:** Third academic building, two dormitories, two cafeterias, library, eight staff housing buildings
- (2028–2030) **PHASE 3:** Fourth academic building, administration building, Jesuit university parish, student center and commons

**\$450,000 funding already received, \$2 million requested from USAID/ASHA*

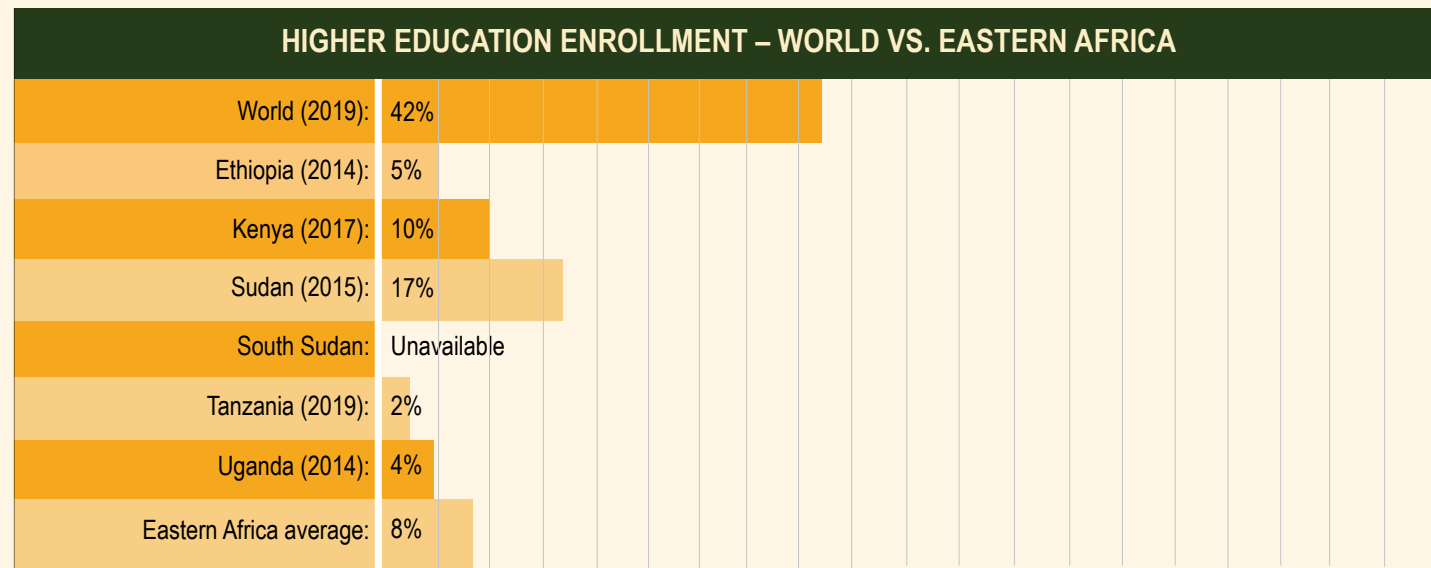

- ▶ Jesuit universities have a proven track record of attracting high-quality faculty in a wide range of disciplines throughout the world.



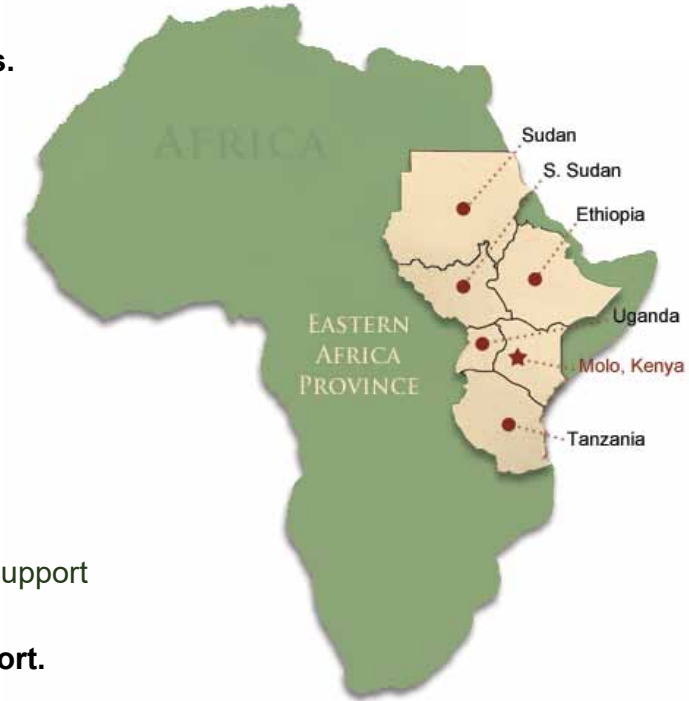

★ Location of the proposed new school

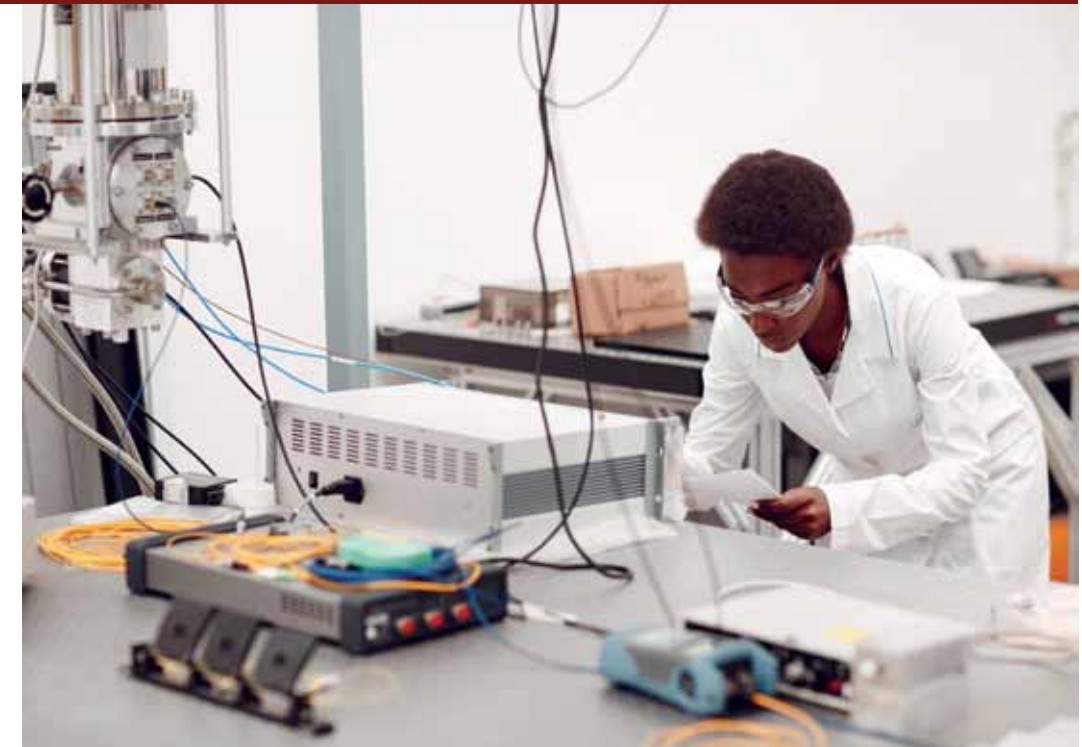
PROPOSED SCHOOLS WITHIN THE NEW LOYOLA UNIVERSITY
